- Always double check your calculation

Calculation: Example 1

A 55-year-old male patient is stabilised on warfarin 5 mg daily at a cost of R 28-80 per month. The patient has his INR monitored weekly at a cost of R117-70 per test. The patient has heard about rivaroxaban from his doctor and wants to know the cost implications. The cost of rivaroxaban 15 mg daily is R637-95 per month. What is the difference in cost between these two options?



Example 1: Solution

Warfarin cost per month is:

Warfarin = R28.80

 $Tests = R117.70 \times 4 = R470.80$

 $Total\ cost = R28.80 + R470.80 = R499.60$

Rivaroxaban cost = R637.95

 $Cost \ difference = R637.95 - R499.60 = R138.35$

Rivaroxaban treatment cost R138.35 more per month




Calculation: Example 2

A patient requires an intravenous infusion of 0.9% w/, sodium chloride. In your hospital pharmacy department you have Water for Injection BP and 4.5% ^w/_v Sodium Chloride Solution BP. Assuming no volume displacement effects, what volume of the 4.5% w/, Sodium Chloride Solution BP need to be added aseptically to an expandable PVC infusion bag containing 100 ml Water for Injection BP to produce the required sodium chloride concentration?



Example 2: Solution



100 ml is equal to 3.6 parts

Therefore:

$$\frac{0.9\ parts}{3.6\ parts} = \frac{X\ ml}{100\ ml}$$

X ml = 25 ml

A volume of 25 ml of the 4.5% w/v solution need to be added to the infusion bag



Calculation: Example 3

Given that the relative molecular mass (RMM) of sodium chloride is 58.5 g/mol, what amount of sodium chloride powder is required to prepare 300 ml of a solution containing 50 mmol/l?



Example 3: Solution

 $1 \, mmol \, of \, NaCl = 58.5 \, mg$

$$\frac{50 \ mmol}{1 \ mmol} = \frac{X \ mg}{58.5 \ mg}$$

$$X = 2925.0 mg$$

If you have $2925.0\ mg\ NaCl\ in\ 1\ L\ of\ solution\ you\ have\ a\ 50\ mmol/L\ solution$

Therefore for 300 mL:

$$\frac{X \ mg}{2925.0 \ mg \ NaCl} = \frac{300 \ mL}{1000 \ mL}$$

$$X = 877.5 \, mg \, NaCl$$





Calculation: Example 4

A pharmacist receives the following prescription:

Rx **Ephedrine HCl**

> Chlorobutanol 0.25 g

Dextrose, anhydrous

Purified water ad 50 ml

prescription to make an isotonic solution?

How many grams of anhydrous dextrose should be used in compounding the

 $0.5\,\mathrm{g}$

q.s.

The sodium chloride equivalent for a 1% $^{\rm w}/_{\rm v}$ solution of ephedrine HCl is 0.3 and for a 1% w/, solution of chlorobutanol is 0.24 and for a 1% solution of anhydrous dextrose is 0.18.



Example 4: Solution

Calculate the equivalent sodium chloride for Ephedrine HCl and Chlorobutanol as follows:

Ephedrine HCl

$$\frac{0.5 \ g \ Ephedrine \ HCl}{1 \ g \ Ephedrine \ HCl} = \frac{X \ g \ NaCl}{0.3 \ g \ NaCl}$$

X = 0.15 g NaCl

Chlorobutanol

$$\frac{0.25 \ g \ Chlorobutanol}{1 \ g \ Chlorobutanol} = \frac{X \ g \ NaCl}{0.24 \ g \ NaCl}$$

X = 0.06 g NaCl

The total NaCl equivalent in the preparation is 0.21 g

 $An\ isotonic\ solution\ of\ NaCl\ contains\ 0.9\ g\ of\ NaCl\ in\ 100\ ml\ of\ solution, thus\ 0.45\ g\ per\ 50\ ml$

The quantity of NaCl therefore theoretically needed is 0.24~g

 ${\it Calculate the equivalent quantity of anhydrous dextrose as follows:}$

 $\frac{\textit{X g anhydrous dextrose}}{\textit{1 g anhydrous dextrose}} = \frac{0.24 \; g \; \textit{NaCl}}{0.18 \; g \; \textit{NaCl}}$

 $X = 1.33 \ g \ anhydrous \ dextrose$



Calculation: Example 5

Calculate the quantity of NaCl (g) that should be added to 150 ml of a $1\% \text{ W/}_{\text{V}}$ solution of apomorphine hydrochloride to render the solution isotonic with blood plasma.

 ΔT_f of a 1% $^{\text{w}}/_{\text{v}}$ solution of the drug and NaCl is 0.08 and 0.58 $^{\circ}\text{C}$ respectively.



Example 5: Solution

$$w = \frac{0.52 - a}{b}$$

$$w = \frac{0.52 - 0.08}{0.58}$$

$$w = 0.758\% \ m/v$$

For a 150 ml solution you therefore you need:

$$\frac{\textit{X g NaCl}}{0.758 \textit{g NaCl}} = \frac{150 \textit{ ml}}{100 \textit{ ml}}$$

$$X = 1.137 g NaCl$$



Calculation: Example 6

How many milliequivalents of potassium ion (K⁺) are there in a 250 mg penicillin V potassium tablet?

Note: Molecular weight of penicillin V is 388.48; there is one potassium ion in the molecule, and the valence of K⁺ is one



Example 6: Solution

Calculate the number of mEq per mmol as follows:

 $mEq/mmol = valence \ x \ number$

 $mEq/mmol = 1 \times 1$

mEq/mmol = 1

Calculate the Equivalent weight as follows:

 $Eq\ weight = \frac{Molecular\ weight\ in\ mg/mmol}{mEq/mmol}$

 $Eq weight = \frac{388.48 \, mg/mmol}{1 \, mEq/mmol}$

Eq weight = 388.48 mg/mEq

There is therefore 1 mEq of K + in 388.48 mg of penicillin V

For a weight of 250 mg of penicillin V:


 $\frac{X\ mEq}{1\ mEq} = \frac{250\ mg}{388.48\ mg}$

 $X=0.644~mEq~of~K^+$

The South African Pharmacy Council (Council), in 2018, developed a new format for the pre-registration examination which is in line with the new competency standards. Council resolved that the pre-registration examination be conducted three times, i.e. in March, July and October as indicated in the schedule below.

- Results will be available online

How to appeal examination results?

- You may submit an appeal against the exam results
- You may apply online for a review of your exam paper
- Above requests must be submitted to Council in writing
- Not later than 30 days after the examination results are released



What happens if you are unsuccessful at the examination?

- You may rewrite the examination at the next sitting
- It is compulsory to re-write BOTH sections of the exam regardless of whether you passed one section previously or not



- Pharmacist Interns may locum, including academic interns.
- Refer to the scope of practice for Pharmacist Interns as provided for in legislation.
- Pharmacist Interns cannot be provided with a certificate stating that they are registered as a Post-Basic Pharmacist's Assistant.
